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MEMORANDUM TO THE MINISTER

OPERATION AFGHAN SAFETY: REVISED IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

FOR APPROVAL

SUMMARY

- The purpose of this memorandum is to obtain your approval of the Revised Implementation Plan for Operation Afghan Safety (Annex A), which takes into consideration the direction you provided via "F-1193519 APP Implementation Plan for the Afghan Humanitarian Resettlement Commitment" (Annex B).
- Per your direction, the Implementation Plan has been revised as follows:
 - Referral partners for government-assisted refugees: Referral allocations have been provided to the U.S. Government and NATO as per existing commitments, increased for Front Line Defenders and ProtectDefenders.eu for refugees and individuals inside Afghanistan; and remaining spaces provided to the UNHCR for urgent protection and other vulnerable cases;
 - An in-Afghanistan program will be established, via Front Line Defenders and ProtectDefenders who will act as a umbrella referral bodies (see Annex C), accepting referrals from Canadian NGOs (i.e., PEN, the Rainbow Coalition), and which will include provisions for biographic comprehensive security screening to be completed prior to facilitating travel;
 - Referral partners for privately sponsored refugees:
- We recommend that you approve the Revised Implementation Plan in Annex A by checking the "I concur" box and signing this memorandum by Thursday, September 16, 2021. This is required to direct the associated public policies/legal instruments required and ensure their readiness for your approval by Friday, September 17, 2021.

BACKGROUND:

• On August 13, 2021, the Government of Canada announced a commitment to resettle 15,000 vulnerable Afghans, in addition to the under the two SIMs, who were forced to flee Afghanistan due to an increased risk of persecution by the Taliban.



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• On September 11, 2021, you approved the Department's proposed implementation plan for this commitment, but provided additional direction.

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- The Revised Implementation Plan will support the resettlement of Government-Assisted Refugees and privately sponsored refugees between now and December 2023.
- The following guidelines and principles have guided the development of this plan.
 - O **Duty of Care:** The Government of Canada owes a legal duty to protect the health and safety of its employees while at work, and will take all reasonable measures in the circumstances to protect its employees from these risks.
 - Trusted implementing partners: IRCC will work with trusted partners with the capacity to support these efforts.
 - Security and medical screening: Security screening, biometric enrolment and medical screening must be completed before any individual travels to Canada to mitigate the risk of inadmissibility, increased uncertainty regarding identity and public health risks.
 - o **Reception capacity:** Arrivals will be spread out over the length of the initiative to ensure the necessary settlement supports are in place to ensure successful integration.
- The following eligibility provisions will apply to all persons referred by partners to Canada, unless otherwise exempt via a public policy:
 - o meets the refugee definition and vulnerability criteria established by partners
 - o part of one or more of the priority groups
- For in-Afghanistan cases, partners will be additionally responsible for referring cases according to the following criteria:
 - o based on highest vulnerability and evidence of being targeted by the Taliban;
 - o known and vetted individuals that pose the lowest security risk; and,
 - o have a viable logistical plan to exit to and remain in a temporary third country should facilitation be issued.
- IRCC will assess admissibility for all cases, including security screening, before travel to Canada. For in-country caseloads, IRCC will screen using biographical data for all referred individuals prior to issuing any travel or facilitating documentation. Biometric enrollment will be completed in a third country before individuals travel to Canada in order to confirm identity and complete the admissibility assessment.

CURRENT STATUS:

• The Revised Implementation Plan leverages existing and trusted referral partners and supports new partnerships with Canadian NGOs and sponsor groups in an effort to maximize

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the success and timely implementation of Operation Afghan Safety. It also provides an avenue for the resettlement of individuals from within Afghanistan. For example, the Department will work with Front Line Defenders and ProtectDefenders as they operate within a consortium that also includes Canadian NGOs (e.g., Rainbow Railroad, PEN), and are uniquely positioned to facilitate individuals' movement to neighbouring countries, safe houses, and flights for onward travel to Canada.

- A total of levels spaces are reserved for government-assisted refugees and are allocated to partners as follows:
 - **UNHCR** This is in addition to the 200 spaces reserved annually for Urgent Protection cases.
 - **Output** Output Contract Outpu
 - NATO A public policy is required to waive the referral requirement as NATO cannot be recognised as a referral partner under the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act* (IRPA).
 - o **Front Line Defenders and Protectdefenders.eu** To permit in-country referrals, a public policy will be required to waive the requirement for individuals to be outside their country of persecution.
 - Ministerial-directed cases

- A total of levels spaces are reserved for privately sponsored refugees. Caps for all Sponsorship Agreement Holders will be increased, and a plan developed to balance eligible cases in inventory and new applications. Both the and who are Sponsorship Agreement Holders, will get discrete allocations as part of this exercise. This is in response to your direction to urgently consider and approach potential private partners with the expertise, capacity and willingness to triage cases, including those that have already been submitted to the department (i.e., LGBTI NGOs, Afghan Women's Organization).
- Notional allocations have been carved out for some of the key organizations that have contacted the department and with whom discussions will take place in the coming days. These allocations are as follows:
 - Sponsorship Agreement Holders, including Afghan Women's Organisation (4,000 existing inventory; 550 2,550 new applications, the exact allocation between existing and new will be determined in consultation with the SAH Council);
 - o new applications); and,

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new applications).

- This overall approach will provide pathways for NGOs and sponsors to identify cases for resettlement, including for minority religious groups (i.e., Hazaras) and addresses the risk of working directly with NGOs who may not have the capacity or knowledge to identify individuals most in need or assist them through the resettlement process.
- No new authorities are needed to fulfill this commitment.

This is not recommended given the high demand for limited spaces available and the already high representation of this priority group in Operation Afghan Safety.

Considerations:

• ProtectDefenders and Front Line Defenders are the Department's newest authorized referral partners and no cases have been resettled to-date under the new Human Rights Defender stream, given their ongoing training on Canada's resettlement process, and pending funding. It is expected that the demand for resettlement of Afghans may create challenges at this early stage of partnership. Funding agreements are being prepared for signature and additional funding will likely be required to support the increasing volumes of individuals that these organizations will support through covert transportation, temporary shelter, and other expenses incurred while arranging Afghans' safe passage to neighbouring countries prior to travel to Canada.

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CONSULTATIONS:

• All referral partners have been consulted, as well as the Rainbow Coalition for Refugee. The Department continues to engage regularly with in-Canada stakeholder groups.

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RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS:

- Funding for this initiative includes committed resources for government-assisted refugee spaces within the 2021-2023 Immigration Levels Plan (12,500 in 2021 and 12,500 in 2022), as well as new funding that was sought for government-assisted refugee spaces committed to Operation Afghan Safety.
- Processing and prioritizing government-assisted refugees under Operation Afghan Safety increases the risk of not achieving 401K in 2021 and will likely offset the projected immigration class mix.

COMMUNICATIONS IMPLICATIONS:

- Media and social media interest in the situation in Afghanistan is extremely high, with confusion between the special immigration measures and the humanitarian stream. There is also significant interest in the opening of the humanitarian stream.
- A key component of the department's strategy for the closure of the special immigration measures is to direct individuals to referral partners to see if they may qualify for resettlement to Canada under the humanitarian stream. The Government of Canada's use of existing referral partners will support the notion of Canada's resettlement system as being both fair and transparent.
- A pro-active communications approach is recommended with an IRCC news release, currently with the Minister's office, highlighting details of the Afghan humanitarian stream.

RECOMMENDATION:

• We recommend you approve the Revised Implementation Plan in Annex A by checking the "I concur" box and signing this memorandum by September 16, 2021. This includes an explicit approval of including

- A memo and public policy for NATO-referred cases is already routing for your approval.

Operation Afghan Safety (OAS): Partner engagement and capacity



UNHCR's work in Afghanistan is focused on protecting the most vulnerable and assisting newly displaced Afghans with life-saving shelter, food, water and core relief items, both within Afghanistan and neighbouring countries.

- Over 300 referrals still in inventory for resettlement for Afghan refugees
- No capacity to provide new referrals in 2021; could begin triaging from existing inventory + refer Urgent Protection cases
- Registration and Refugee Status
 Determination process will begin,
 depending on outflows to
 neighboring countries, this will take
 time
- No mandate to assist Afghan nationals to flee to their border

HRD partners have networks in Afghanistan that could facilitate transit to third countries for Afghans who are aligned with their mandate (there is intersectionality)

In Afghanistan

 Reliable networks in place that could identify urgent cases and facilitate their movement to a third country, conditions on the ground and resources permitting.

Outside Afghanistan

 Refer cases and facilitate charter flights. FLD has 200 referrals ready for Afghan human rights defenders in Pakistan Private sponsors can identify cases that meet the priority groups for this initiative who are in third countries

- Approx. 10,000 Afghans in current inventory of over 70,000 (3 years' worth of inventory based on current levels plan)
- Caps for Sponsorship Agreement Holders will be increased by 1,000 -3,000 now to allow for new referrals; additional cap spaces to be allocated in 2022 should increase to levels be secured – to avoid further displacement of other PSRs
- New applications can be submitted immediately for arrivals in 2022 and 2023 as a result of priority processing

Interpreters in Canada who were admitted under previous SIMs, directly or via veterans groups, can identify cases for referral now. However, no partner in Afghanistan to reliably confirm identity

- Public policy under consideration for the extended family members of former interpreters who came to Canada under 2009 and 2012 measures; cap to be determined based on available levels space, funding, and desired timing of admissions.
- Applications can be submitted once public policy and process in place; arrivals late 2021 -2023

 Afghans make up one of the largest refugee populations worldwide. There are 2.6 million registered Afghan refugees in the world, of whom 2.2 million are registered in Iran and Pakistan alone.

CURRENT CONTEXT IN AFGHANISTAN

- The overwhelming majority of Afghans will remain inside Afghanistan and will require increased humanitarian support and funding.
- Neighboring countries will soon begin to face new outflows from Afghanistan while continuing to host existing Afghan refugees whose return prospects have diminished, as well as others who may have left for family, business or medical reasons, but who can now no longer safely return.
- All Afghan refugees will need longerterm solutions. The vast majority may voluntarily return when the conditions are right, and at a time of their choosing.
- In comparison, resettlement to third countries – a chance for the most vulnerable to restart their lives in a new country – is an option for only a tiny proportion of the world's refugees.

Without these partners, Canada cannot responsibly meet its humanitarian commitment to Afghanistan

We are currently in a period of uncertainty in terms of referral targets and capacity

- No new referrals in 2021
- 2022 levels have yet to be determined

Capacity to bring Afghans to a transit country and charter flights to Canada

<u>Further direction on the memo "F-1193519 - APP - Implementation Plan for the Afghan Humanitarian</u> Resettlement Commitment"

Establish an immediate mechanism for referrals within Afghanistan:

- In response to the urgent protection needs of highly vulnerable populations and very limited ability to exit Afghanistan to seek refugee status, allow select experienced and trusted organizations to refer candidates for refugee resettlement as GARs and PSRs from within Afghanistan.
- Select and designate referral partners based on expertise, capacity and willingness to triage
 cases and consider cases that have already been submitted to the department by trusted
 organizations. Urgently consider and approach potential partners such as Front Line Defenders,
 Protect Defenders, Rainbow Refugee, Rainbow Railroad, AWO, PEN, CCR, and potentially other
 established SAHs and NGOs, in order to select referral partners within a week.
- Establish principles and a set of guidelines to be used to prioritize referrals and mitigate risks.
 - o Prioritize referrals based on the following factors:
 - highest vulnerability and evidence of being targeted by the Taliban,
 - known and vetted individuals that pose the lowest security risk, and
 - viable logistical plan to exit to and remain in a temporary third country should facilitation be issued.
 - o Potential criteria for consideration:
 - Clear fit with the identified priority at-risk groups
 - Identified and vetted by trusted partner/referral organization
 - Low-risk from a security perspective
 - Viable travel plan by land or air
 - A transit country identified as being able to host for a period of time until individuals can be processed
 - Plan and commitment by trusted organization to provide support in transit country
